Wisconsin Tribal Conservation Advisory Council Meeting Minutes Tuesday, January 13, 2009 St. Croix

Meeting called to order at 9:30 by Jonathan Pyatskowit.

1. Roll Call

Present: Bad River (Pam Roberts), Forest County Potawatomi Community (Nate Guldan), Ho-Chunk Nation (Greg Blackdeer, Sheena Schoen, Bill Hopinkah), LCO (Brett McConnell), Menominee (Jonathan Pyatskowit), Oneida (Pat Pelky), St. Croix, (Marty Shutt, Tony Havranek), Lac du Flambeau (Scott McDougall), Red Cliff (Tracey Ledder), Mole Lake (Roman Ferdinand, arrived at approximately 3pm).

Tracey Ledder is the new representative for Red Cliff.

Others Present: David Armstrong (Judicare), Tony Bush (NRCS), Julie Malvitz (NRCS), Greg Yakle (NRCS), JoAnn Cruse (APHIS), Sherrie Zenk-Reed (NRCS), Tom Fredrickson (NRCS), Keith Sengbusch (NRCS), Tom Cogger (NRCS), Jerry Thompson (Retired)

2. Approval of Minutes

MOTION: Motion to approve December 2, 2008 meeting minutes. Motion by LCO, seconded by FCPC. All ayes, zero opposed, motion carried.

3. NRCS UPDATE

Jerry Thompson gave the update for NRCS; Pat Leavenworth could not make it due to the weather. Final rules for EQIP are going to be posted in the federal register this Friday. The sign up has been extended to the end of February.

Julie Malvitz indicated that Pat Leavenworth wanted to let Jerry know how much she has appreciated what he has done for WTCAC and how invaluable he was during the audit. She will be presenting him an award for all of his hard work. Furthermore, she wants to make sure she can attend the next WTCAC meeting.

Julie Malvitz will be taking over Jerry's duties related to the grant agreement and the cooperative agreement. She will be the new agreement manager. Jerry gave Jonathan amendments to the WTCAC agreements to change the agreement manager to Julie. She will be the one to grant NRCS approval of projects.

Greg Yakle will be WTCAC's contact for adding practices to the docket and developing new payment schedules.

Julie Malvitz will take over the partnership efforts with Forest Service and APHIS.

Greg Yakle will take over partnership efforts with the National Fish Habitat Action Plan and BIA. BIA doesn't have much money but could provide technical assistance. BIA will be trained in designing projects to NRCS specs and could be brought on as pseudo assistants with Tribes to help with NRCS projects.

Tony Bush and Julie Malvitz will be coordinating the American Indian - Alaska Native Employees Association (AIANEA) conference. Jerry Thompson has all of WTCAC's history on his computer and is volunteering for NRCS to help us put a presentation together. We have an hour the opening morning of the conference for a presentation.

NRCS Headquarters wanted to know how Pat Leavenworth was working with Tribes in Wisconsin because she is doing it differently than all others. We are the only organization functioning how the rules say we should be. Everyone is looking at us for guidance.

Renee Anderson will continue to work on our educational materials and annual report. We can pay for this out of our meeting costs.

There is no one at the moment who will be taking over helping with the Section 106 MOUs. It will take a lot of time yet, so Pat Leavenworth needs to think about it.

Keith Sengbusch and Greg Yakle will be responsible for coordinating trainings and workshops. Helping sponsor the AIANEA Conference, scholarships, etc can be used as workshops.

Sherri Zenk-Reed will continue with summer students. We could use WTCAC funds to sponsor some summer interns with NRCS or Tribes. In order to do this, we would need to amend the agreement.

3. Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative (CCPI)

We originally were concerned we would lose technical assistance and administrative money however Jerry learned that we could do a generic version of a CCPI based on how we are structured. We are currently doing everything CCPI is required to do except for promoting the programs to individuals. At the State Conservationist's discretion, they could authorize administrative funds out of their own technical assistance budget. For this year, Jerry thinks he could write up the proposal based on what we are already doing and submit to Pat Leavenworth so when the next fiscal year starts we could take the template and continue to do what we do. Pat Leavenworth would then commit funds to WTCAC as a CCPI. She has a directive to have a certain percentage of her program funds to be obligated under CCPI agreements. In the CCPI application, if we feel like we need extra funds, we could ask for more funds for EQIP and WHIP than we have received in the past. Jerry doesn't think there are any negatives to this for WTCAC. If we wanted, Jerry would be willing to put together an application packet for us. This would also be an accomplishment to show for our 501(3) application. He thinks it would help build on our future needs. Jerry will check if there is a conflict with being a

technical advisory committee as well as a CCPI. If we do not spend all of the money we are allocated, it would just go back to NRCS.

MOTION: Motion to ask Jerry Thompson to put together a draft document for WTCAC's CCPI application. Motion by Lac du Flambeau, seconded by FCPC. All ayes, zero opposed, zero abstentions, motion carried.

****Conference Call on February 3 at 10 am to discuss and approve CCPI application**** Jerry will email the draft application by the 27th of January for us to review prior to the conference call. Roman will set up the conference call.

4. EQIP AND WHIP

All EQIP AND WHIP applications need to be in to NRCS by the end of February. Please work with your liaisons to get applications in on time.

4. APHIS Update

Aphis update given by JoAnn Cruse. APHIS does not yet know what their budget is.

EAB has not been found anywhere else in Wisconsin since the last update. APHIS is currently in the process of putting together an EAB trapping program. Let JoAnn know if anyone is interested, traps need to be put in place by the middle to end of May. They would appreciate any help we can give them on Reservations. Purple traps will be used again. If you have any trapping records from the past season, please get them to her. She could bring the traps to a meeting in April so please let her know if you want any (Joann.M.Cruse@aphis.usda.gov).

The final report from VisionQuest for the EAB study is in. Jonathan will make a few modifications to it and will submit the final version to APHIS.

There is still a 4 county quarantine; regulated wood has begun to move. The regulated wood must be processed by May 1. They are in the process of making a selection for a position to monitor the mills, etc. They are also making a selection for a permanent position in Wausau.

JoAnn gave an update on behalf of Veterinary Services. Contagious equine metritis (CEM) has been found in some out of state horses. It only occurs in horses and affects reproduction. Wisconsin is testing horses that may have come in contact with infected horses.

5. Financial Update

Brett gave the financial report. He has the travel checks for everyone for October – December travel. Please make sure to always get him your travel forms, he is missing some.

There is about \$9,000 extra in the checking account from money that Stockbridge returned that they did not need for their small project. We need to make sure this money eventually gets spent on a small project.

2005 Agreement

We need to make sure all small projects that were planned to be done by September 30, 2009 get finished by then. All of these projects were obligated to be paid out of the 2005 agreement. The projects are:

Bad River Culvert - \$25,000 Bad River Trout Habitat - \$13,922 Mole Lake Logan Bridge - \$15,000 Mole Lake Invasive Species - \$3,775 GLIFWC Invasive Species - \$29,081 Oneida Invasive Species - \$29,499 Oneida Sugar Camp - \$15,000

We also have \$30,000 remaining for workshops and \$10,000 for a consultant for strategic plan. Obviously we will not need to hire a consultant for strategic planning as Chris Borden is helping us free of charge.

For the 2005 agreement we have a total of \$44,166.55 that is not obligated and needs to be obligated and spent by September 30, 2009.

2006 Agreement

For meetings we have \$60,000 for FY09 and FY10 plus \$10,000 slippage from FY08. Therefore we have about \$70,000 to spend for meetings by September 30, 2010.

For pilot project we started with \$106,263.07 and the only project approved is 2010 GLIWFC Invasive Species Project for \$6,948. Therefore we have \$99,315.07 yet unobligated that needs to be obligated and spent by September 30, 2010.

Brett turned in a form for travel reimbursement today so we will have about \$160,000 left total.

6. Judicare

David Armstrong indicated that he is working on the 501(c)3 application. He got the last things he needed today. There is another section of the nonprofit code that exempts municipal associations. He feels we should have the same status. He is waiting to talk to someone in Milwaukee about this. If we can qualify for this we do not have to file taxes.

We need to get the amended by-laws approved. ****We will discuss and approve the by laws on the February 3 conference call****

The application from the state for incorporation needs to be submitted about a month before we submit 501(c)3 application. The fees for incorporation will be \$40 and the fees for the 501(c)3 application will be \$750.

Pat Pelky indicated that we could ask Oneida for a donation to cover the incorporation and 501(c)3 fees.

MOTION: Motion to request a \$790.00 donation from Oneida to cover the incorporation and 501(c)3 application fees. Motion by FCPC, seconded by LCO. All ayes, zero opposed, Oneida abstained, motion carried.

Jonathan will draft a donation request letter to send to Oneida.

7. Outreach Initiative

Pat Pelky volunteered to pull together a request for proposal for an outreach initiative to hire a contractor to develop videos, brochures, website, etc for outreach and education about the functions and successes of WTCAC.

8. Student Internships

Wisconsin Land and Water Conservation Association (WLWCA) has Conservation on the Land Internship Program and could set up interns for us. Julian Zelazny is the Executive Director. We give them money and they advertise the position using restrictions we put on it. We then get the applications and decide who to hire. They take care of paying the student.

MOTION: Motion to sponsor four Native American student internships through the Wisconsin Land and Water Conservation Association (WLWCA) with a stipend of \$5,000 apiece for a total of \$20,000 with preference given to members of Wisconsin Tribes and to pay the Wisconsin Land and Water Conservation Association \$3,000 for administrative support. Two of the internships would be with NRCS (Rhinelander and Spooner) and two would be with Tribes (Ho-Chunk and Lac du Flambeau). Motion by Oneida, seconded by Ho-Chunk. All ayes, zero opposed, motion carried.

This will require an amendment to our agreement with NRCS. Jerry Thompson indicated he would draft the amendment.

9. Midwest Glacial Lakes Partnership Support Letter

We will discuss the Midwest Glacial Lakes Partnership (MGLP) Support Letter on the conference call on February 3. So please review the strategic plan I sent out last month in preparation of the conference call (I will resend this out). Jonathan indicated that if we choose to show our support, he will draft the letter.

10. Annual Report and Educational Materials

We will need to talk to Julie Malvitz and Renee Anderson about the annual report and educational materials. We need to determine what Tribes have not submitted information to Renee. Nate will talk to Renee and see who she hasn't got information from.

11. Small Project Sign Up

Need to get the pre-application to Julie Malvitz for NRCS approval and then if she approves, it will be sent back to the Tribe and they must bring to WTCAC for final approval. It was decided that WTCAC would accept new proposals until the next meeting on March 3, 2009 at Ho-Chunk. *Therefore, proposals must be sent to Julie Malvitz by February 16 for NRCS approval and then brought to the March 3 meeting in Ho-Chunk.* We need some projects that will be completed this year but will also fund projects for next year.

12. LCO Small Project Final Report

LCO presented their final report for the small project titled "Logging Road Reseeding/Erosion Control Demonstration Project." LCO has been partially paid for the project and are requesting the final \$8,101.37 (the total cost of the project was \$15,000).

MOTION: Motion to approve final payment of \$8,101.37 to LCO for the Logging Road Re-seeding/Erosion Control Demonstration Project. Motion by Oneida, seconded by St. Croix. All ayes, zero opposed, LCO abstained, motion carried.

15. Next Meeting

The next meeting is scheduled for 9am on Tuesday, March 3, 2009 at Ho-Chunk.

MOTION: Motion to adjourn. Motion by Mole Lake, seconded by LCO. All ayes, zero opposed motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 4:08 pm.

Description of Project Elements Completed:

Completed the re-seeding of different cool season seed mixtures on 15 acres (7.5 miles) of newly created logging roads.

PROJECT IN-KIND PERCENTAGE AND DESCRIPTION:

Project in-kind was an intern from the LCO Community College, Department Vehicle use, Department ATV use, and gas/oil costs. WTCAC funded \$15,000 for the Project. The in-kind totaled \$6,730 or 45% (10% required match).

BUDGET SUMMARY

A detailed budget summary is attached to the final report.

Project Description

Over the past several years, the LCO Tribe has taken part in an aggressive harvesting campaign to manage tribal forests. Hundreds of acres of overly mature Aspen and mixed hardwoods have been harvested. In the process, miles-and-miles of logging roads were created, many in close proximity to delicate watersheds, rivers and streams.

Under the WTCAC Small Projects Program, the LCO Tribe was awarded \$15,000 to re-seed 15 acres of logging roads as a demonstration project to determine which seed mixtures would be most suitable and cost efficient for erosion control. The following is a description of the seeds and seed mixtures used in the project:

There are many different seed varieties to choose from. Upon consultation with NRCS and Sawyer County Land and Water Conservation Department staff, the following plant seeds were chosen for the different mixtures based upon soil types, shade tolerance and drought resistance.

Creeping Red Fescue

Planted in Northern cool season areas. Red Fescue is a fine bladed grass with medium to dark green color. Great for shady and full sun conditions. Good drought resistance.

White Clover

High in protein, drought resistant, great for deer and birds. Very expensive seed.

Timothy

Thrives in many different soils. Very tolerant to acidity. Great grass to plant on highly erodible land.

Red Clover

High protein, great for deer and birds, but very expensive.

Alsike Clover

Preference is full to partial sun. Very high value to wildlife, always seed with grass. A hybrid of the red and white clovers.

Smooth Bromegrass

Cool season grass resistant to drought periods. Grows best in well-drained silt or clay loam soils, but works in sandier soils too. Good ground cover and erosion control. Very hard to establish.

Seed Mixture 1

30% Timothy (2.5 lbs./acre)

15% Red Top (1.25 lbs./acre)

55% White Clover (5 lbs./acre)

Seed Mixture 2

78% Smooth Bromegrass (17 lbs./acre)

6% Timothy (1.25 lbs./acre)

11% White Clover (2.5 lbs./acre)

6% Alsike Clover (1.25 lbs./acre)

Seed Mixture 3

56% Smooth Bromegrass (12.5 lbs./acre)

17% Creeping Red Fescue (3.75 lbs./acre)

11% Alsike Clover (2.5 lbs./acre)

17% White Clover (3.75 lbs./acre)

Project Summary

LCO Conservation Department (LCOCD) staff along with an LCO Community College intern began in the Spring discing abandoned logging roads with the ATV and Plotmaster. Once the ground was thoroughly disced, the seed was added to the Plotmaster bin and application began. No watering was done for the project.

The majority of the soils in the project were of the silty and sandy loam variety. Seed Mixture 1 worked the best in most all areas. The LCOCD highly recommends using this seed mixture in any full or partial sun area. The pictures below show the prepping and result of Seed Mixture 1.

Establishing your seeding rate can become quite complex. The majority of known seeding rates call for heavier application rates than the LCOCD employed. Most literature available has application rates of clover anywhere from 4 to 14 lbs. per acre. The results of this project revealed that 2-4 lbs. of each clover in the mixture was sufficient in establishing ground cover and preventing further erosion.

Grasses like Brome and Timothy have higher seeding rates. It is important to combine the grasses with the legumes (clovers). A mixture of grass plants and legumes provide a lower risk of production failure; and legume plants often fill voids in the grass system, and remain productive during the summer months.

One thing to consider in your re-seeding efforts is the ease of broadcasting. The brome seed was very difficult to seed due to its large size. LCOCD staff at times had to hand broadcast this grass seed because it would clog the Plot Master seed bin holes.

Cost is always an issue with any conservation project. When determining your mixtures and seeding rates make sure you are aware of current market prices for seed.

White Clover \$5.39/lb.
Red Clover \$3.39/lb.
Timothy \$1.69/lb.
Brome Grass \$3.00/lb.
Alsike Clover \$2.29/lb.
Red Fescue \$2.19/lb.

Recommendations

In order to ensure that your seeding project is successful, all logging roads should initially be bermed or gated to prevent any motorized vehicle travel. Two of the roads which were planted had much lower survival rates due to vehicle access in the Summer months. All re-seeding should be conducted in the Spring of the year due to more favorable moisture and temperature conditions.

In areas with heaver soils, dragging the Plot Master can pose problems. An ATV with at least a 600 cc engine is recommended.

The LCOCD planted at a minimum of 8 foot wide roads.

8' wide planted road equals .97 acres/mile 12' wide planted road equals 1.45 acres/mile 16' wide planted road equals 1.94 acres/mile

**When determining acreage keep in mind that most all logging roads have widened landing areas.
